Sir:

Your favor of the 12th inst is at hand. Our stamping of documents is confined to imprinting two cent stamps on bank checks, sight drafts and plain forms of receipts that have the words "good when used for payment of money" first printed thereon. We are in no case allowed by the Government to stamp blank paper, hence the printed instruments must always be sent to us.

Charges for imprinting are one cent per page of six stamps or less each, and a half cent per impression of one stamp.

The cost of printing should be inclosed in the printed documents and sent to us by express, prepaid, and the stamp value, if over \$50, remitted to the Office of Inter. Rev. Washington, D. C. Or, you may more conveniently send the documents to any one of the dealers here, either of whom will pay the revenue charges and our own, and collect the total from you when the work is completed. For commissions allowed and other particulars please address the dealers direct, viz: J. E. Ridgway, J. R. McFetridge, and W. E. Crockett, all of Philadelphia, Pa.

The Commissioner of Inter. Rev. has referred to us your letter of the 16th inst in regard to engraving a private revenue stamp.

We are appointed by the Government to make revenue stamp plates and print stamps therefrom. Our charge for engraving a private die and making plate complete is uniformly three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350) and the time required to do the work and prepare an adequate stock of stamps to keep ahead of demand is usually about eight weeks.

The stamps are furnished without charge for printing, except when they exceed in dimensions the size of the ordinary stamps of the same denomination, in which case we are authorized to charge at the rate of ten cents per thousand stamps of 3 1/8 inches superficial area; and for all other sizes in proportion, for extra paper & printing, and three cents per thousand for extra perforation.

The Government allows to proprietors of private dies a commission in stamps of ten per cent on all orders over five hundred dollars at a time; or, in other words, allows \$561 in stamps for \$510 in money.

If you conclude to have the die made please send us further notice, and we will prepare the necessary model to submit to the Hon Commissioner of Inter Rev for his official consideration and approval.

Your favor of the 17th inst is rec'd with comments in regard to the arrangement of the lettering on your proposed stamps. we shall of course make the change in the engraving according to your suggestion. As we will require the model to work from we cannot sent it to you at present.

In looking through our back correspondence in letter book we are unable to find that we have communicated to you our charge for engraving a die, and to save misapprehension on the score we will now state particulars that you may in view thereof decide whether or not you will have the work done. We would state in the meanwhile we have already submitted your application to the Commissioner of Internal Revenue and he has approved the same, so that the die can be proceeded with as soon as we receive your reply.

Our charge for engraving a private die and making stamp plate complete is uniformly three hundred and fifty dollars and the time required to do the work is usually from six to eight weeks.

The Government allows a commission on stamps, to proprietors of private dies, of ten per cent on all orders of over \$500 at a time, or, in other words allows \$550 in stamps for \$500 in money.

We keep an adequate stock ahead to meet orders on demand.

Your favor of the 21st inst, claiming one sheet short in recent package is rec'd.

We duly investigated the matter and found our balance all right, indicating that the proper quantity was sent. We imagine the cause of the seeming deficiency would have been discovered at once had you accurately counted all the sheets, for it sometimes happens that the "fifty" markers get displaced while we are filling the orders from our stock lots, and no doubt in this case, where the one part of a hundred contained only forty nine sheets, you would have found that the other part contained fifty-one sheets.

In their manufacture the sheets are carefully counted in all the several departments of our business, and any inaccuracy would inevitably be manifested, hence our stock is correctly accounted for, and, as we send those stamps to no other house it follows that we could not be in ignorance of any mistake.

Of course we believe you think a deficiency existed, but we feel that our perfected system of checks is a good reason for us to think otherwise. The regulations of the Internal Revenue Bureau require that all packages of stamps be opened in the presence of two witnesses, and no claim for deficit will be allowed unless an affidavit setting forth the facts, subscribed by them, is first submitted to the Commissioner for consideration.

Trusting, however, that you will by this time see that a miscount was in all probability made at your factory and thus relieve us of further anxiety on the subject, we remain,

Our charge for engraving a private stamp die and making plate complete is, uniformly, three hundred and fifty dollars, payable upon receipt of a proof impression from the finished die. Each denomination of stamp requires a separate die: for each additional die, when the design is the same as the first with change merely in the letters and figures of the denomination, our charge is two hundred dollars.

The Government furnished stamps of the ordinary size without charge for printing etc. - but when they exceed 13/16 of an inch superficial area for one and two cent stamps, and 63/64 of an inch for other denominations, we are authorized to charge at the rate of ten cents per thousand stamps for those 3/ 1/8 inches superficial area and for all other sized in the same proportion, for extra paper & printin, and also three cents per thousand for perforation.

In reply we have to state that we are the Government agents appointed manufacture revenue stamps and dies. Our charge for engraving a private die and making a stamp plate complete is uniformly three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350). Each denomination required a separate plate, for each additional die and plate of the same design as the first except the alteration in the words and figures of the denomination we charge two hundred dollars (\$200) which would make for your three denominations viz 1, 2 & 4 cts, seven hundred and fifty dollars.

Stamps from private designs are furnished without charge for manufacturing except when they exceed the size of the ordinary Government stamps of the same denominations in which case we are authorized to charge at the rate of ten cents per thousand for stamps 3 1/8 inches superficial area and for all other sizes in proportion, beside three cents per thousand for extra perforation.

Your four cent die will be transferred to plate for printing in course of the present week. We will notify you of the exact time to make your first order for that denomination so that it will reach us about the time stamps are in readiness to meet it. In consequence of the official delay to your one cent die we cannot have the plate made for that denomination in less than two weeks from date, and we will also duly notify you in regard to it.

All orders for stamps should be addressed to Hon'e C. Delano, Commissioner of Inter. Revenue, Washington, D. C. (Stating denominations and required amounts of each), enclosing the duplicate certificate of a U.S. Ass't Treasurer, or designated depository, of a deposit made covering the value of stamps ordered. Upon receipt of your remittance the Commissioner will at once make a requisition on us and stamps will be sent you forthwith.

We keep a three months supply of every kind of stamp, so that no delay occurs after we once commence to fill orders.

Mr. Pugh, who necessarily depends on us for information regarding the filling and packing of stamp orders, has referred* to us your favor of the 13th inst, wherein it is insisted that the package previously referred to, contained a deficit of ten one dollar stamps according to its accompanying invoice.

In replying we take the opportunity to assure you that we have every confidence in "your sincerity in making the claim; yet, as we are so very sure that no mistake was made by us - as evinced by the result of checks applied in filling every order - that an acknowledgement of error on our part is impossible; and we can only attribute the discrepancy to a mistake by you in overlooking the ten stamps. Our long experience in the business has taught us precisely where to look for missing stamps, and, as suggested in our last letter on the subject, we have no doubt that the missing fragment of a sheet adhered to the underside of the full sheet of fifty cent stamps lying immediately above it, and was thereby unconsciously removed from the package. An examination may yet bring these to light in your possession; or, may you not have sold the fifty cent sheet with the ten stamps still adhering to it?

We are particularly positive in this instance where the order was filled in the regular way. Telegraph orders however are an exception and readily susceptible of errors, as our checks do not apply the same to them, and ** we were led into error in the two instances which you cite, although, you will admit, we detected them*** ourselves and notified you thereof immediately we received the regular Government requisitions. Filling orders by telegraph is done only to accommodate dealers and is an uncertain and inconvenient way of doing such business. Happily, however, it is almost entirely confined to your orders, and we trust in you to assist us in making necessary corrections.

Your letter of the 17th inst notifying us that Messrs Wirt, Cox & Co. of Baltimore, and P. Eichele & Co St. Louis, complain of discrepancies, and requesting us to make necessary examination and report result to your office was received on the 21st inst.

In compliance therewith we beg to assure you that we are positive that no error was made by us in either case, and we believe that whatever errors actually existed were made at the places of the parties named, who, as we have received no evidence from them to the contrary, did not count and examine their stamps immediately upon receipt of their respective packages, and being too confident in their own regard readily attributed their discrepancies to us. We cannot make an error in counting and packing without discovering it ourselves, and when one occurs we invariably notify the Government Agent here of the circumstances of the case, and let him make the necessary adjustment.

For a full explanation of the cases in question we cannot do better than submit all of our correspondence with the parties on the subject, remaking in addition thereto that the package referred to by Wirt Cox & Co was purchased by them from Mr. J. L. Thomas, Baltimore, Md., to whom it had been sent, with fifteen other packages, in pursuance of your requisition of Aug 23/69, and was not received directly by the former although there is no reason to suspect that the packages were tampered with while in Mr. Thomas' care.

Messrs Wirt Cox & Co say we make errors sometimes and refer to two instances when we acknowledged having done so. To show how these were made it is necessary to explain that for the last six months they have been getting nearly all their orders filled through telegraph dispatches, from your office to Mr. Pugh, a day in advance of our receipt of the regular requisition containing the order. On an average we have been filling about three of these orders each week, all calling for a variety of stamps, and in many cases it borders on guesswork to decipher the unpunctuated messages with the writing out of the numbers and figures of the stamps & denominations running into each other. And, besides, in filling isolated orders for general stamps we have no opportunity to apply the usual checks, and coming late in the day they require hasty action by all hands to get them up in time for Mr Pugh's delivery. Hence in one of the telegraphic orders we sent to them the fraction of a sheet bearing two 25 cent stamps in excess of the correct amount. In the other we sent 100 stamps at \$1.50 in lieu of 150 stamps at \$1.00. In both cases however we detected and located the error ourselves immediately we put up the following day's requisition containing the order in its regular shape; and moreover notified them of the facts (through Stamp Agent) ere they seemed to be aware that any error had been made. The fact that we discovered, traced and at once pointed out these things to those gentlemen, instead of being a proof of carelessness on our part is the best testimony of the accuracy of our delivery.

As we have had no reply from Messrs Eichele & Co to our letter, a copy of which is herewith, we can say nothing further on the subject but trust they will acknowledge that they may have been mistaken.

Your communication of the 22d instant, returning our statement, vouchers and account of stamps delivered in September, 1869 is received.

A reference to our accounts shows them to be consistent: the statement is certainly in accordance with the actual stamp deliveries.

The difference between us, according to your letter, appears to be 127.000 stamps, or an excess of charge on our part of 222.000 one cent, and a deficiency of 65.000 two, and 30.000 three cent stamps - this difference also makes the money value of yours \$20 less than we figure it.

We have compared the month's requisitions with our books and find their amounts correctly entered. The orders were all executed as per requisitions except No 4702, Sep 14. to E. Ferrett which originally called for 66.000 two cent stamps instead of 132.000 at one cent. Mr. Ferrett having a one, but no two cent die, the matter was referred to, and adjusted by, the Stamp Agent here, who informed us that he notified you on the subject at that time.

We can therefore only resubmit our a/c without alteration, and, to verify its correctness, as well as to point out where the difficulty really exists, we send herewith the October requisitions for private stamps, and have to request that you will please duly return them to us after comparing them with the books of your office.

The charge for engraving a private die and making plate, complete is uniformly three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350). It usually requires about eight weeks to execute an engraving order.

If the design for a four cent stamp dies not exceed superficial area 63/64 of an inch there will be no charge for manufacturing the stamps, but for an increased size a charge will be made for extra material and printing, at the rate of ten cents per thousand for stamps 3 1/8 inches superficial area, and three cents per thousand for extra perforation.

The Government allows to proprietors of private dies a commission, in stamps, of ten per cent on all orders of over \$500 at a time, i.e. for a remittance of \$510 gives \$561 in stamps.

A sufficient supply of private stamps is always kept on hand to duly meet the demand.

Our charge for engraving a private stamp die is uniformly \$350; the only exception to this being when a label combined with the stamps is wanted, in which case the charge is increased according to the character and quantity of the work required. A die, plate, etc, complete, for a stamp the size of design submitted would cost simply \$350 for the one denomination, and \$200 each for additional denominations of same design.

If the Government should ever abolish the stamp duty it is not likely you would get possession of the dies and plates.

The cost to manufacture, without perforation, would be, for the size stated, about five and a half cents per thousand stamps.

Orders for private stamps are addressed to Commissioner of Inter Rev. accompanied with remittance. 5% commission is allowed on orders of \$500 or less at a time, and 10% on amt's over \$500 - That is for \$510 remitted you would receive \$561 in stamps.

Your favor of the 20th inst is rec'd. Our stamping of documents is confined at present to imprinting with the two cent die (eagle design* on bank checks, sight drafts and plain forms of receipts having the words "good when used as a receipt for payment of money" first printed thereon.

Our terms are one penny a page of six or less stamps each and a half penny per page of only one stamp.

We do not receive money for the stamp value of the imprinting; that should be paid to the Government directly or indirectly by you in either of two ways. The first by remitting to the Commissioner of Internal Revenue a duplicate certificate of an Ass't U.S. Treasurer or Designated Depositary, of a deposit made covering the value of stamps to be imprinted and inclosing an order stating that the stamps are to be imprinted on documents, and at the sametime you will forward the sheets for stamping, with am't of printing charges, to our address, and upon the Commissioner's verification to us the work will have prompt attention and be duly returned to you.

The other way and the more convenient (inasmuch as the Commissioner will not receive a remittance of less than \$50), is to send the documents to be imprinted to one of the stamp dealers in this city, either of whom regularly remits to the Government for the purpose of executing such orders and is duly authorized to have the work done, and he will attend to the entire matter for you on his individual account and collect the total of charges, stamp value as well as for imprinting, from you, by express when the work is finished and returned.

These dealers order from the Government large enough amounts of stamping in advance to entitle them to the maximum commission of five percent and if your trade is an object to them they will deduct a part of this commission from their charges against you.

I have no specimens to exhibit as each is supposed to be an original and we can vary to suit your taste from the one which you submit & will adopt either your or our own ideas in regard to the details as you may prefer.

The charge for engraving a private die and making stamp plate complete is uniformly three hundred and fifty Dollars, (\$350) and the time usually required to do the work and print an adequate stock of stamps to commence with, is about eight weeks.

Stamps of the ordinary size are furnished without charge for manufacturing but for increased size the charge is at the rate of ten cents per thousand for stamps 3 1/8 inches superficial area, other sizes in same proportion, besides three cents per thousand stamps when perforated. A stamp the size of Hostetter's would cost about ten cents per thousand stamps for extra paper and printing without perforating.

The government allows a commission of ten per cent on all orders from proprietors of private dies, of over \$500 at a time, i.e. for a remittance of \$501 in money it gives \$551.10 in stamps.

Sir:

We hasten to advise you of an oversight in filling the California Order which our monthly settlement of a/c stock reveals.

One item of said order called for 170.000 stamps (15ct Inland Exchange Stamps); and at the time the order was filled we had not received from the Gumming & Perforating Departments a sufficient balance to comply perfectly with this demand and also that of the regular requisitions on receipt. Accordingly the whole of the rest of the order was made up and put aside until these stamps were ready: a memorandum-notice (or blank) on the order noticing the omission. It would seem, however, that the packer forgot afterwards the circumstances and the packages packed up were boxed and timed up without these 170.000 15ct Inland Exchange Stamps. The regular balancing of a/cs showed this discrepancy and by reference to the original order we discover where the error lies. Shall we forward the omitted stamps to the same address in California or shall we deduct the amount from our a/c?

We await instructions, expressing our great regret that a treacherous memory has led to this oversight. We have reason, however, to be perfectly satisfied with our system of a/cs which has not failed thus far to indicate unerringly any deficiency or surplus of stamps.

Gentlemen:

I observe the grounds for your comments respecting the last lot of stamps, and will prepare others at once to exchange for such as you deem unfit for use. It will require about ten days to prepare a complete stock. I have about 4000 sheets on hand, however, of the same kind sent you today on balance of order, and will exchange them with you for these on the thick paper. The paper itself is the cause of the whole difficulty and has been a source of loss and much annoyance to myself from the fact that the manufacture of that which I originally used in stamp printing was stopped several months ago by the Gov't with the then intention of supplying in its place a special paper marked in a peculiar manner for easy identification. For some reason the new paper has been held back leaving me no recourse but to obtain what I could from the market, to meet the regular demand for stamps, and the unsuitable character for printing etc of much of the paper thus obtained has resulted in the dissatisfaction which you and others have justly expressed.

I am now using a paper similar to the original stamp paper and made by the same man facturer, which appears to work well, and you will please forward to me at once 'by express' such stamps as cannot be used and I will forthwith send you in exchange what I can and the balance as soon as possible afterwards.

I am the appointed Agent of the Government to manufacture revenue stamp dies and plates and to print stamps therefrom. The Commissioner of Inter. Revenue has referred to me your letter of the 24th inst and I reply thareto that it is only necessary for you to send me a sketch of design and size of the required stamps, stating the wording to go on it, and the matter will have due attention. The charge for engraving a private die and making stamp plate complete is uniformly three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350) and the time to complete the same about ten weeks.

Stamps are furnished without charge for manufacture except when they exceed the size of ordinary stamps of the same denomination, in which case we charge for the excess of size at the rate of ten cents per thousand for stamps 3 1/8 inches superficial area and for all other sizes in proportion, besides three cents per thousand for perforation.

I am the Agent of the Bureau to engrave private dies and to print stamps. The charge for engraving a private stamp die and making plate complete is uniformly three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350) and the time required to do the work about eight weeks.

Private stamps are furnished without charge for manufacture except when they exceed in size the ordinary stamps of same denomination in which case there is a charge of ten cents per thousand for stamps $3 \frac{1}{8}$ superficial area for extra paper and printing and all other sizes in proportion, besides three cents per thousand for perforation.

Yours of the 30th ulto to hand. My authority to stamp documents is limited at present to the imprinting of the two cent stamp (eagle design) on bank checks, sight drafts and plain forms of receipts, the receipts to have the words "Good only when used as a receipt for payment of money" first printed across their face.

I do not receive money for the revenue or stamp value of the imprinting: that should be paid to the Government in either of two ways, viz by remitting directly to the Commissioner of Inter. Rev. a duplicate certificate of a U.S. Asst Treasurer or Designated Depository of a deposit made covering the value of stamps to be imprinted (over \$50 at a time) inclosing an order stating that stamps are to be imprinted by me, and at the same time you will forward to my address by express (prepaid) the sheets for stamping with the am't of printing charges inclosed; or, the other way, and perhaps the more convenient, is to send the sheets to ~~name~~ of the dealers in this city (either of whom I will mention regularly remits to the Government and is authorized to have the work done) and he will attend to the matter for you on his own account and collect the total of charges, stamp value as well as for printing from you when the work is finished and returned.

The charges for imprinting are one penny a page or pull of six stamps or less each and a half penny for pages of only one stamp each.

The dealers order from the Government at one time large enough amounts to entitle them to the maximum commissions which it allows i.e. five percent and if your trade is an object with them they will deduct from their charges against you a large part of the commission. On the 17th inst I submitted specimens of the form of draft which you sent me, to the Inter. Rev. Bureau for approval to imprint it with a two cent stamp. The reply thereto, noted in pencil on one of the forms returned, was "Permission cannot be granted. The form is as well suited to a time draft as any other. It might be printed with the usual limitation. Is it drawn upon the Cashier's own bank?" Pursuant thereto I resubmitted the form with an explanation as far as I could give one and again asked permission to stamp it. To this the Dep. Commiss. replied that it was "approved for a stamp of two cents with limitation "Good only for sight draft". This limitation however, is a prohibition so far as I am concerned, as it means that the words indicated are to be printed on the face of the draft, and as by my process of stamping I cannot impart those words with the stamp, I have no recourse but to return the drafts to you - which I do by to-day's express - and will say that I regret my inability to comply with your wishes and would gladly have attended to the matter had I been permitted to do so.

Gentlemen:

Your letter of the 7th inst covering check for \$175, is duly received. As the check is erroneously drawn in favor of James R. Carpenter, I am compelled to return it for correction. It should be in favor of Joseph R. Carpenter.

I regret you are vexed about your stamp, but do not think you are just to me. Let us look at the facts of the case:- You order a private stamp to be engraved in accordance with your own design as to what is best for your business. Though you have ample time between the date of the order and the completion of the engraving, an interim of several weeks, you do not discover nor claim until the last moment that you (not I remember) have made a grave mistake, and the stamp cannot be used as you intended. When informed of your blunder I consent to accept 50% of the original price, thereby incurring myself not only a heavy loss pecuniarily, but ----- the waste of valuable time, labor and skill of my engravers ---- the work executed in strict compliance with your instructions. You are now very indignant because I will not engrave you a new stamp ---- at a loss to myself and, without courtesy, style my regular charge "an outrageous extortion". I submit very respectfully that to expect me to pay for your error of judgment is certainly more creditable to your confidence in my magnanimity than complimentary to my business knowledge and experience.

Were my arrangements with the Government of such a nature as to cover the cost of my engraving department I would cheerfully furnish private stamps free of cost, but, such not being the case, I feel that I do quite enough in making such a charge for private dies and plates as will expose me to no greater loss in that department than I have experienced for several years past, viz: a loss of several thousand dollars per annum. I have, moreover, to add that I do not believe the Government will at any future day undertake to furnish private stamps free of cost to the proprietor, particularly when so large a discount is allowed private over general stamps: a discount which in a short time, if any amounts of stamps be ordered, not only pays for the expense of the plate but allows a handsome profit thereafter.

In conclusion I have the honor to state that my price for engraving your new die and plate will be three hundred and fifty dollars \$350 - and you will please instruct me further how you wish to have it in size and design.

I am inclined to respectfully state in view of the possibility of a repetition of the circumstances that I have reason to believe that the claim is founded on your own error, and, without supposing that the sheet was ----* removed at your place (although nothing in the affidavits indicates there was no opportunity for it due to the interval between the opening of the package and the counting of the stamps) that the error occurred in this wise, viz: There having been in the package 400 sheets 2 cent general on top, 200 5 cent next below, 50 10 cent next to them etc, it is probable that your clerk has counted off first 401 in mistake for the 400 sheets sent, thereby lifting from the package the one sheet of 5 cent stamps, and upon finding the balance of the----* of 199 sheets attributed the discrepancy to mistake-----* whereas had he looked under the lot of 2 ct stamps which he first lifted from the lot, the missing sheet of five cent stamps would have been discovered at once.
